

ConCourt rules against ANC on City of Cape Town logo

The Constitutional Court has dismissed the African National Congress application for leave to appeal the Supreme Court of Appeal's (SCA) decision in January 2017 to dismiss, with costs, an earlier appeal in the City of Cape Town logo matter.



On 25 July 2017, the Constitutional Court considered the applications for condonation and leave to appeal. It concluded that the ANC's application for condonation should be refused because of a long delay, the absence of an acceptable explanation for the delay and the lack of prospects for success. The application for leave to appeal was dismissed.

"We welcome the judgment by the Constitutional Court, which upheld the SCA's January 2017 ruling in which it decided not to hear the matter because there was no reasonable prospect of success in an appeal," says Patricia de Lille, Executive Mayor of Cape Town.

"The City has once again been vindicated by this decision taken by the highest court in the country. This signals the end of the road for the ANC's court battle over the logo and we appeal to them to work with us in focusing their attention on service delivery and making progress possible together with the people of Cape Town. We can now continue getting on with the good work we started in the past six years and take service delivery to the next level.

"We also call on the ANC to pay the City's legal costs as soon as possible."
