And by the time the caucus meeting began, it was confirmed that the bill would be withdrawn, reinforcing the idea that the decision had been made over the weekend at the ANC's national executive committee and that the caucus's function was to rubber-stamp it. This left Motshekga with just one question to answer. Why?
